The League of Catholic Women led the way in 1906 with a vision and mission to fight poverty. Today our mission remains the same as we continue to touch hearts and change lives in our community. With over 500 skilled and specially trained employees and over 50 programming sites throughout the metropolitan Detroit area, Matrix is the 22nd largest non-profit in Southeast Michigan and one of the largest operating in the City of Detroit. Matrix Human Services is rebuilding neighborhoods by moving individuals and families out of poverty and bringing households to self-sufficiency by servicing over 20,000 children, individuals and families annually.

### **OUR APPROACH**



### HEAD START BIRTH TO 5

Head Start is an integral part of the community and in the lives of children and families. Program services include early childhood education, health, nutrition, and parent involvement. Head Start takes a two-generation approach, because families are integral to supporting children's successful early learning and development. The program builds relationships with parents that support family well-being, promote strong relationships between parents and their children, and provide ongoing learning and development for both parents and children. As a trilingual program, our Birth to Five program is sensitive to the cultural differences, strengths and uniqueness of our community.

The program uses a high-quality, research-based curriculum that promotes measurable progress toward children's development. Subjects for curriculum content and learning outcomes include such domains as Social and Emotional Development, Language and Literacy, and Cognition.

Another unique feature of Head Start is the family partnership. Family Advocates, who function like social workers, are involved from the moment a child is enrolled to assist each family with needs identification and goal setting. They engage in regular communication with families to understand goals for their children and themselves, and work toward those goals together. Families' goals may include actions such as obtaining a job, housing stability, and advancing their own education.



Family Advocate (FA):

Every family enrolled in the EHS/CCP program is assigned a Family Advocate. The FA supports the family in developing goals, assists the family in obtaining community resources, and engages with Advocate) credential. the parent on a regular basis. They implement a parent curriculum and conduct parent gauge surveys/ interviews to determine the level of engagement between child and parent.

#### **Content Area Support:**

Education, Health, Nutrition, Disability, PFCE, ERSEA and Quality/Compliance teams actively support the Child Care Partners. Teachers and Families. The technology. Child Care Partner, EHS/CCP Teachers and enrolled Parents participate in Professional Development training opportunities and Head Start Regional and National Conferences.

Matrix has successfully supported the Child Care Partners with facility and playground improvements Such as, Shade elements, soft surfacing and fencing at all of the child care centers and homes. Interior improvements include windows, doors, flooring, lighting, entire classroom furniture replacements and

#### Child Development Specialist (CDS):

Every Teacher is assigned a CDS who directly supports the teachers in all areas of the classroom. curriculum implementation, and best practices in child development. The CDS works alongside the teacher as a coach and trainer to ensure the children are receiving quality services.





## THE MATRIX CENTER

The Matrix Center, our cummunity center that is utilized by over 120 Mission-Partner organizations and groups providing services to not only the Osborn community (48205 zip code) but to residents across the city and surrounding cities. The Matrix Center encompasses a collaborative network of human services and community programs designed to meet the social, physical, spiritual, and educational needs of residents. Services and programs at the Center include: after school programs, financial literacy, youth mentoring, food distribution, workforce development, health resources, transportation, children and youth programs, counseling, community development, adult training programs, sports and recreational activities, health services, computer training, crisis intervention services, diaper closet, clothing closet, and legal aid. The center is open 360 days a year, 85 hours weekly, serving 4,200 Detroit residents monthly. Revenue sources for the operation of the center comes from Mission Partner space and lease agreements, grants, private donors, corporate support, and fundraising.

### MATRIX HOME BUYER PROGRAM ASSISTS MAN LIVING WITHOUT RUNNING WATER FOR 2 YEARS

Meet Albert, who for decades, was living in a home previously owned by his aunt but was lost to tax foreclosure due to a job loss.

Because of financial circumstances. Albert lived without running water in the home for about two years. Growing up without running water prepared him for the experience.

"I was buying water ya know, doing whatever I had to do to survive in the house. Go to other people's houses, take showers, use rainwater, flush the toilet, I'm from down south and when I grew up we didn't The only step left was for Albert to save \$1,000 to buy have running water. We survived so... You can survive. A lot of people might not think so but you can."

At this time, a pilot program of United Way was finding individuals in precariously housed situations and compiling a list. Matrix Human Services was given this list of people who needed help. Eventually, Javay Coleman, Financial Empowerment Coach at Matrix Human Services, received Albert's file.

"So our purpose was to call them and kinda find out where they are in the process. Get them financial coaching. Help them with workforce development if possible. But the goal was to get them to a place where they can own their home." - Javay Coleman Albert began working with Matrix on May 24, 2019 for financial coaching to buy back the house through the Detroit Land Bank Authority (DLBA) "Occupied Buy-Back Program".

"(Matrix) called me for a meeting and I came in, and I met Javay and she was very instrumental in helping me

do all this stuff that I needed to do... Encouraged me to do it because at that point, I was kinda like discouraged about the whole process."

One of the qualifications of the DLBA buy-back program is that the occupant must have a history with the house, whether that means being a previous owner or tenant, having paid utilities for at least twelve months, can demonstrate they made significant improvements to the property, or a family member was the last owner on record before public-ownership. Albert met the qualifications.

the house back, a requirement of the DLBA buy-back program. Through financial coaching assistance with Matrix, Albert found a part-time job working 20 to 30 hours a week, created a budget to save the funds to purchase the home from the DLBA, and made a plan to have the water restored in his home. Matrix was also able to attain funding from United Way of Southeastern Michigan to meet Albert half-way with the payment on the house as well as fees to restore the water.

Mr. Scott closed on his property on August 30, 2019 and finally has running water again.

"I was stressed out. I was just worried all the time. Down in the dumps." "I'm almost stress free now." - Albert



## **SOCIAL MOBILITY**

The Social Mobility Centers are a collection of programs and services under the Adult and Senior division of Matrix Human Services. The collective goal of these Centers are to assist Matrix Human Services achieve its mission of supporting families and rebuilding neighborhoods in Detroit. Our programs and services are designed to help clients move from poverty to self-sufficiency. Below you'll find a brief description of each Center and their respective outcomes for the year.

#### FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT CENTER

The Financial Center is designed to assist clients reach their personal finance goals and to educate them on all things pertaining to economic upward mobility. Services within this Center are: one-on-one financial coaching and counseling, financial capabilities classes, tax prep assistance.

Financial education workshops provided to 540 unique participants.

Clients credit score increased and 70 established credit for the first time.

Increased their net income and 87 increased their net worth.

Clients received tax prep assistance.

Clients received rental assistance/ mortgage totaling \$5,000 for the year.



### MATRIX RYAN WHITE HIV/AIDS PROGRAM (EST. 1994) MICHIGAN AIDS COALITION - MAC HEALTH (EST. 2009)

Provides comprehensive services to assist individuals living with HIV/ AIDS. Offering service coverage that extends across Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Monroe and Lapeer counties, the Matrix Ryan White Program's safety net ensures patients are linked and maintained in medical care through medical and community service referrals, mental health therapy, in-home care, case management, and so much more.
